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CAPSTONE EXPERIENCE REQUIREMENT [Effective: Bulletin '21/'22]: Any three units at 500 or 600 level apply. These units may contribute to the Studies and/or Electives Requirement: **Course(s)**:

- A total of 13 units from a community college (articulated or with a faculty advisor's approval) may be applied to courses in the Cinema major. These are typically Core courses, but up to 6 of those units may be in screenwriting and/or filmmaking/video production electives. Transfer units may not count towards Foundation or GWAR classes.
- If the minimum residence requirement of 12 units in the major is satisfied, credit for upper-division courses in the major from another four-year university is allowable if syllabi are comparable and with a faculty advisor's approval.
- With advisor pre-approval, up to 12 upper division units from other departments at SFSU may count toward the major. These are typically courses in the creative arts, humanities, and/or with a focus on film or media. Consult your advisor for more info.
- A maximum of 4 one-unit courses in any combination of CINE 325, 326, and 650 may count toward the major.
- A maximum of 12 units of the following courses may count toward the major: CINE 376, 690, 692, 699.
- A maximum of 9 CR/NC units may count toward the major.

COMPLEMENTARY STUDIES (12 UNITS) [Effective: Bulletin '14/'15]: This university requirement applies to all Bachelors of Arts students. For Cinema majors:

- Students who complete a second major, a minor, or 12 units of a foreign language automatically fulfill the requirement.
- All non-CINE prefix units are eligible for this requirement, including lower division, upper division, and transferred units.

MINOR IN ANIMATION (15 UNITS):

- Students may receive a minor in Animation by completing these five courses: CINE 365, 444, 445, 664, 665
- CINE 444 is only offered in the Fall semester, and students must submit a portfolio to be accepted into the class. Consult the Cinema website for information on submitting a portfolio.
- Classes completed for the Minor also count toward Cinema major electives.
- The Animation minor is available to students outside the Cinema major.

Students should regularly consult with their assigned advisor or an available faculty member of their choice.
